


ACCESS INFORMATION



Subaru Line 5th Station is only accessible by bus or taxi during the official season due to the regulation of private vehicle

Access to Mt. Fuji

Car	<p>Visitors from Gotenba, exit at Fujiyoshida IC. Continue to go east then turn right at first corner. Fujisan Parking Lot will be on the left for about 200m.</p> <p>Visitors from Otsuki, exit at Kawaguchiko IC. Turn right and then turn left first light at Mt. Fuji World Heritage Center. Turn left again at the next light. When you see the parking sign, turn right and you will be on your left for about 200m. Afterwards, you will see the Parking Lot. Please refer to the Fujisan Parking Lot Map</p>
Train	Transfer the train from JR to Fujikyuko Line at Otsuki Station. Take off at Mt. Fujisan Station where the shuttle bus to Mt. Fuji is available.
Bus	Direct bus from Shinjuku Bus Terminal to Mt. Fuji 5th Station is available.



Mt. Fuji has been worshipped as the dwelling place of gods since ancient times. Unimaginably vast and beautiful sights can be found at its summit.


Mt. Fuji Principles (Yamanashi/Shizuoka Prefecture)

Three Plans to Enjoy Climbing Mt. Fuji

Please cooperate with "Mt. Fuji Conservation Fund" in order to preserve the mountain environment and ensure the safety of climbers. The standard donation is 1,000 yen per person.

1 1 night / 2 days | Sunrise at a hut



● Perfect choice for beginners!

Arrive at the 7th / 8th Station around 5:00 pm and stay overnight at a hut. This allows climbers to gradually acclimate to the elevation and climb at a relaxed pace. Welcome the sunrise from the great view of the hut. This plan is ideal for those that are not determined to see the sunrise from the summit. This relaxed plan offers climbers with plenty of time to rest at the hut.


2 1 night / 2 days | Sunrise at the summit



● The gold standard!

Arrive at the 5th Station at around noon and have a relaxed lunch while acclimating to the elevation. Start climbing in the afternoon and arrive at a hut at around 5:00 pm. Catch some sleep until around midnight and depart for the summit. Welcome the sunrise from the summit at around 4:30 am. Take a hike around the summit crater (Ohachi meguri) and descend to the 5th Station.

3 2 nights / 3 days | Climb at relaxed pace



● Get the most from your hike!

Stay at a hut between the 5th and 7th Station on the first day. Use this time to enjoy the short Ochudo Hiking Trail at the 5th Station. Welcome the sunrise from the hut on the next morning. Then, climb to the summit during the day without the crowds than climb throughout the night. After summiting, stay another night at a hut around 8th Station while enjoying the unique nighttime view of the lights from far below.


Climbing from the Base "Kanadorii Gate to Summit"




STOP Bullet climbing!

Climbing up overnight without staying at a mountain hut is very dangerous. Taking safety into consideration, make a climbing plan with plenty of time to spare.

From base to summit on the Yoshida Trail Mt. Fuji Climbing

Kanadorii ↔ Summit
 Ascent : 11 hr 30 min
 Descent : 6 hr 20 min

The hike up the Yoshida Trail was once a pilgrim's path to worship Mt. Fuji. The trail is dotted with historic sites and cultural assets. Among the grand nature here, you can almost hear the prayers of generations past. Follow the footsteps of over a thousand years of climbers, taking in incredible vistas as you make your way to Japan's greatest summit, a world above the clouds.

Mountain climbing season for Mt. Fuji is from July 1st to September 10th. It is very dangerous except for seasonal climbing.

1 Kanadorii

This is the first torii gate on the journey up Mt. Fuji, and it marks the boundary between the ordinary world and the sacred realm of the mountain. Soak in the breathtaking view of Mt. Fuji before setting off on your adventure!



2 Oshi, Former Togawa Family Residence

This Oshi Pilgrim's Inn was once used as a lodging by worshippers of Mt. Fuji. Get a closer look at the building's unique architecture, attire worn by followers of the Fujiko religious group, and more at the Former Togawa Family Residence, which is open to the public.



3 Kitaguchi Hongu Fuji Sengen-jinja Shrine

Fuji worshippers begin their trek with a visit to this sacred shrine. Eleven of its halls are designated as Important Cultural Assets. Aside the right side of main hall, you can find the gate that marks the traditional start of the Yoshida Trail.



4 Nakanochaya

This teahouse has been in business for over 300 years. As the midpoint between the Yoshida Trail starting point and Umagaeshi trailhead, it's a perfect time to have some rest and small meals.



5 Umagaeshi

As evidenced by its name (horse return), horses used not to allow entering the trail at this point. At the torii gate, the pair of monkey statues placed as guardians of Mt. Fuji. Beyond this gate, the land is sacred, and the trail grows steeper.



6 2nd Station

The Fuji Omuro Sengen-jinja Shrine (Hongu - main shrine) was built here in the early 9th century to placate Mt. Fuji in the time of eruptions. Between 1973 and 1974, the main shrine, the Important Cultural Asset, was moved to Satomiya in Fujikawaguchiko Town. However the front shrine is still sit.



7 4.5th Station

Gozaishi Sengen-jinja Shrine and Inoue, the mountain hut are lined along the trail at 4.5th Station as representing worshipper's prosperity and the strength of faith. In the past, women were allowed to climb to this point for Mt. Fuji's "birthday," celebrated once every sixty years.



8 5th Station

This area marks the timberline, so views from the hiking trail will suddenly leap up in scale, allowing you to look over swaths of nature and distant mountains. The air is also thinner, so steady your breath before moving on.



9 6th Station

The Fuji-Subaru Line will be merged here. On the lively path ahead, you'll find well-developed zig-zagging paths and many mountain huts. Tread carefully so as not to send rocks tumbling down.



10 Original 8th Station

The Subashiri Trail will be merged here. Now we enter the grounds of Fujisan Hongu Sengen Taisha Shrine, the domain of gods. The gravel trail gets steep here, so make sure you're topped on water and have used the restroom before heading for the summit.



11 Summit

After a steep climb, pass through Kusushi-jinja Shrine's torii gate to reach the Yoshida Trail summit. Only a bit further to Mt. Fuji's rim. Let the accomplishment sink in and enjoy the views, then head out for a walk around the rim.

STOP Bullet climbing!

(Be careful of one-day climbing by beginners!)

"Bullet climbing" means leaving the Mt. Fuji 5th station in the evening and climbing up overnight without staying at mountain hut. Climbing overnight increases the risk of altitude sickness and accidents due to exhaustion. If you would like to climb Mt. Fuji, we wish you to make a safe climbing plan.

Equipment for Climbing Mt. Fuji

 Plastic bags Rain gear (Separate type)
